Also offers Leaders in Training for ages 14-22. Ability Camp is a “camp within a camp” designed for youth who need smaller ratios to thrive in a safe and inclusive environment. This fully mainstreamed program supports children and teens of all abilities, pairing them with age-similar peers. Counselors provide physical, emotional, behavioral, and cognitive support to help campers succeed in all activities. To join Ability Summer Camp, campers should be mainstreamed part of the day at school, succeed in a 1:3 ratio, and be independent with toileting and feeding. Those needing 1:1 support are welcome with a family-provided personal care aide or support person. Season runs through mid August. Ability Camp is available at the following locations: Camp Carr, Deer Path/Flemington, Doylestown, Quakertown, Leaders in Training offered in Doylestown and Quakertown. 



Located in a residential community two blocks from the ocean, in Avalon, New Jersey. Sessions run June through August and accommodate children ages 7-15 for week-long summer vacations. While attending camp, campers enjoy a variety

of activities that may include: amusement park rides, swimming at the beach, and visiting the boardwalk. All campers participate regardless of the extent of their vision loss, while establishing relationships with other children who may have a similar visual impairment. Having a staff to child ratio of one-to-five, campers must be able to feed, clothe, and bathe themselves with limited assistance, as well as walk up and down stairs. ## THE HOLE IN THE WALL GANG CAMP

Summer program serves seriously ill children ages 7-15 and their siblings, plus Adolescent and Young Adult Programs ages 16-25. For those who have cancer, serious blood diseases (including sickle cell disease, hemophilia, thalassemia, aplastic anemia, etc.), hereditary and acquired immunodeficiency and metabolic diseases, some children with very rare diseases (e.g., primary pulmonary hypertension, FOP) see list of qualifying medical conditions on website.

Family weekend programs include sickle cell, hemophilia, cancer, metabolic disease, serious blood diseases and immunodeficiencies. Offers a sibling program. All applications are reviewed by the medical team. Decisions are based on the child's inability to attend another camp, the severity of the child's medical problems, whether the child has been to Camp before and other factors. MAC works in conjunction with Frost Valley YMCA. MAC campers are between the ages of 8-18. Campers in the MAC program are included in the larger camp population, while still maintaining a camaraderie and pride in their villages. Within the MAC villages, there is a ratio of 3:1 (camper:staff) maintained at all times. This allows for additional support with ADLs (activities of daily living), navigating social interactions, and flexibility for each individual’s specific needs. 
